Module Summary

Design Synthesis is the final module in Second Year and is the last stage of development of the Comprehensive Design Project. The module is aimed at producing a resolved architectural thesis and design proposal that demonstrates a mature handling of spatial complexity, high resolution of the design ambitions; clear articulation of a critical position; evidenced appropriate ethical and professional judgement; sophistication in visual and verbal communication. Impact of work undertaken in the Design Tectonic module should be evidenced in the development of the design, and Design History studies demonstrably presented and argued through the thesis.

Students will produce a final portfolio and verbal presentation aided by visual material drawn from the portfolio. They will be able to demonstrate a high level of rigour and precision of method that parallels real-world conditions and constraints. An edited presentation is made for the live Viva Voce and then further distilled to be exhibited at the LSA Summer Show.

Module Aims

To prepare students for entry to the profession as a provocative and powerful design practitioner, this module aims:

- To provide students with the opportunity to demonstrate a clear architectural ambition, realised through a critically rigorous design proposition.
- To support students to develop the tools and methodologies to hold on to the integrity of their architectural intent, reconciling the strategic skills of envisioning with the core competencies of delivery, integrating aesthetic and technical concerns, and balancing speculation with plausibility.
- To enhance a student's ability to articulate and discuss their approach to design and to develop a design language, represented and communicated through an personal graphic signature.

Module Learning Outcomes

On completion of this module students are expected, within the scope of a personal project brief, to be able to:

- LOI. Apply appropriate theoretical concepts to the reflective and iterative development of a design proposal
- LO2. Design sophisticated spatial proposals demonstrating understanding of current architectural issues, originality in the application of subject knowledge and, ideally, testing new hypotheses and speculations

- LO3. Evaluate and apply a comprehensive range of appropriate visual, oral and written media to test, analyse, critically appraise and communicate design proposals
- LO4. Solve problems, form professional judgements and make proactive and appropriate decisions in complex and unpredictable circumstances

Indicative Module Syllabus

Students draw up an individual plan of work for this module in discussion and in agreement with their tutor. Based on feedback from previous reviews, the plan identifies all elements of the Comprehensive Design Project that require further clarification, articulation and refinement to attain a high level of design resolution.

Design Synthesis aims to consolidate the year's work into a single portfolio and edited presentation. The module is taught in parallel with Design Tectonic which provides for the mutual testing of conception and realisation of the Comprehensive Design Project through 2d, 3d and 4d modes of representation, including an artefact at 1:1/1:15 scale, sketching, physical and digital modelling tests, orthographic drawing and time-based media.

The programme of Praxis talks, Practice Network talks, workshops and all-school design charrettes are all important reference points in the design teaching of the programme.
